So, much like the month, I'm going to keep this short and sweet! Happy Valentine's Day everyone!



SPEAKER: DANIIVES

"Fiber Artist"

Dani Ives is a self-taught fiber artist and founder of <u>Good Natured Art</u>. Her inspiration comes from a love of nature and science, which has an enormous influence on her work. Dani stumbled upon needle felting while pursuing a conservation education career. Over the course of a few years, Dani developed her distinct style of needle felting that she calls "painting with wool." With this style, instead of using paint and a brush, she uses wool fibers and a felting needle to create the effects of layering color, creating texture and depth. She strives to push the boundaries of this fiber art by creating animal portraits and botanical pieces that are packed with details and realism.

Dani has taught hundreds of students in workshops across the United States and internationally. Dani lives in Northwest Arkansas and is currently writing her first book.

Block of the Month:

Follow the example to make an 8 ½" x 8 ½" unfinished block to be entered in a drawing at the **FEBRUARY** MEETING.

You may enter up to FIVE (5) blocks for the drawing. Each block entered is counted as one (1) entry.

Free Pattern: Scrappy Shamrock Block

Just in time for St. Patrick's Day, here's an easy-to-piece Scrappy Shamrock block. It's based on simple four patch squares with stitchand-flip corners.



To make it even easier, we're using grosgrain ribbon for the stem -you can also use a bias tape maker tool and create fabric stems.

What size is it?

You can make this block any size you would like. Simply assign a size to each patch of the block. If you assigned 3" (finished) to each patch, the block would be 12x12" when completed. If you assign 2" (finished) to each patch, the block would be 8x8" when finished. For this example, we're going to make the quilt block 8x8".

How is it made?

Let's first break the block into quarters:










You can see that the "petals" of the shamrock are three identical blocks. Because this is a scrappy block, we're not going to strip piece this time. Gather up all of your green fabrics, and cut 2.5" squares -- for each shamrock block you make, you will need 12 squares. At the same time, cut one 3.5" green square and set aside

Stitch your 2.5" squares into four patches, using a 1/4" seam allowance. Your four patches should measure 4.5" square:



For each Scrappy Shamrock block, cut nine 1.5" squares and one 4.5" square of your background fabric. Set aside the 4.5" square for the moment.

Take the 1.5" squares and add to three contiguous corners by aligning the raw edges, right sides together, and stitching diagonally across the background square:





Flip background square back to stitching line and press carefully. Repeat for remaining two corners. Make three for each Scrappy Shamrock block you need



The stem unit is next. We used grosgrain ribbon for the stem ... lay the grosgrain across your 4.5" background square and stitch down the edges using a matching thread, being careful not to stretch the background square.






Lay your 3.5" square of green over the stem, align raw edges and stitch diagonally. Fold back and press carefully.



Assemble three petal units and one stem unit for form your Scrappy Shamrock block:






1) Create a block to be used as the center of your quilt. Minimum size 12" per side, maximum size 16" per side. It CAN be rectangular! It can be pieced, appliqued, painted, a pretty panel, whatever you want as long as it fits in that size.

To the first meeting with your block, also bring any scraps, fat quarters, etc., that you would be glad to have included in future rounds. Those who work on your quilt CAN use those pieces or ignore them completely, their choice. Also include a note, if you wish, to specify any preferences, such as "do not use any cat fabric" or "you can use black if it works." But again, your preferences may be ignored. Part of the pleasure here is giving up control. Really.

2) Border 1. We'll exchange blocks at the meeting in February. There will be 4 borders added to the center block. The FIRST border may turn your block on point and add a border of up to 3" wide. OR if not turned on point, the first border may be up to 4" wide.

- **3) Border 2**. Add a border up to 5" wide. Consider using different borders top/bottom different from left/right, or top/right different from bottom/left. Example: you might want to use 4-patches across the top and bottom, while using flying geese left and right. PLAIN unpieced borders are okay for one or more, too!
- 4) Border 3. Add a border up to 5" wide. Consider using applique or curves to break up linearity.
- **5) Border 4**. Add a border up to 5" wide. This is the last added border. Consider how this border finishes the work.

As you can see, this is more like suggestions than rules. Size limits were put in simply to keep the finished tops a manageable size. Also, we emphasize having fun rather than following rules.

We'll exchange in February, April, June, August and October. In November we'll get the top with our block back and we'll show and tell. It will have 4 borders added to our block.

Here are some examples of Round Robin guilts:



These are square. They can also be rectangular.

PAINTING WITH WOOL

TAUGHT BY DANIIVES

Since 2013, Dani Ives has been exploring the needle felting technique of painting with wool. She likes to describe it as using nontraditional materials like wool fiber, linen, felt and a barbed needle to mimic traditional painting and drawing techniques. Her goal is to elevate the craft of needle felting and push the boundaries of this fiber art to be more revered as an artistic medium. So, she creates highly detailed pieces that often surprise viewers when they learn the medium is wool. Dani's work

consists mostly of animal and botanical pieces, and she draws upon her background in biology and conservation education to help bring her favorite subjects to life.

This workshop location is to be determined and will be held on Thursday, February 22nd, time and location to be announced.

Saturation

The intensity or purity of a hue. A color is fully saturated when it is at full strength with no white, black, or shades of gray added to it. Fully saturated hues can be strong and vibrant compared to the same color dulled with white, black, or gray. For instance, a fully saturated red will not have any hints of white, black, or gray added to it. A red that has some white added to create a softer red (think carnation pink) is lower in saturation because the purity of the red color is not as strong.

Secondary

A color produced by mixing any two primary hues in a system together in equal proportions.

Shade

Any hue mixed with black. Hues that are shaded are low in saturation (the intensity of the color is dampened by black) and appear to be darker in value. For instance, adding black to red will result in a dark, reddish-brown color; adding black to blue will result in a very deep, dark blue.

Tertiary

A color produced by mixing one secondary hue with one primary hue in equal proportions.

- Cut 24 5" squares, subcut diagonally
- Cut 8 5" squares
- Cut 16 3 ½" squares
- Cut 64 2 ½" squares



• Cut 128 2 ½" squares

Diagonal quilt blocks = showstopping setting opportunities!

We'll use the Iced In pattern to create some blocks, using our own and maybe even other quilters' fabrics, then play with them to create endless setting options to make those quilts sparkle.

I often say when you buy a pattern, it's okay to change the fabric or setting to make it your own, so come challenge yourself to do just that! It's a fun day of learning a few new tips and hints and sewing with friends – and absolutely no cleaning the house! See you there! - Beth Helfter
