## Quilt Registration: A New Approach

## An interview with Sheila Bayles

A new approach. This could have been the mantra for Sheila as she trekked down the path of changing the face of quilt registration. This was the inaugural year to utilize an online database for registering quilts for the show. This process streamlined information and created easy access for those using the database. See Sheila's interview on the process below!

## What actions did you have to take to have it ready for the guild?

After getting input from the quilt show committee on changes from last show's registration and categories, I created the form. I then had several of those committee members test out the form to look for any glitches. We caught a couple of things. These were corrected before the registration form went live.

## What were the greatest advantages from having the database online?

There were two main advantages and they were huge. First, there was only ONE file for all quilt show committee members to access. If some information needed to be edited or added to, those changes were made to a single file. As anyone else accessed the file, they had immediate access to that changed information. Second, this made all of the information available electronically and saved several committee members hours of re-typing information. This increased the efficiency by leaps and bounds.

## Were there any challenges?

Very few. We did have a few members who were not comfortable filling out the form online. We were available at several meetings and a couple of Saturdays to help those members.

## Anything you would improve upon for next show?

I would like for any members who have ideas for improvements to the form or registration process to let me know, either in person or by email, sbayles1120@gmail.com. Thanks to everyone for embracing this new method of registration. It was most helpful to the committee members who needed access to the information.


## Show det Up <br> by Diane Crandell

What goes into setting up a Quilt Show? A lot! Here is just a sneak peek into what it takes to get the Show ready for our visitors...

First, Barbara Hamernik and Kathy Turner use the photographs you sent in and the information in the database to lay out the quilts in the show. Barb literally spreads out the pictures of the quilts on the floor of her home to decide which quilt will go where. This prevents the same quilt pattern or design being next to each other, or having quilts that just simply don't hang well next to each other!

Barb also has a layout of the quilt show building and overlays the quilt show on top of it so she knows where all the poles and stands go when the quilt show is set up. On the set up day, Barb is at the fairgrounds early and has taped off the floor as to where each of the pole support stands are to go and where the aisles are. While Barb is marking off the floor, volunteers are going to the storage unit and loading all the poles, stands, drapes, "S" hooks and chains into the truck.
The truck arrives at the show and many volunteers unload the truck and lay out all the poles on the floor according to length: 8', $9^{\prime}$ and $10^{\prime}$. Also in size: $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ and $3 / 4{ }^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter. The smaller diameter pipes are what the quilts are hung on. The larger diameter pipes are the frame of the show. Then the volunteers go up and down ladders putting together the framework of poles and stands that hold the quilts and the drapes. Many other volunteers are handing up the poles and screwdrivers to the
 volunteers on the ladders. Couplers are used to connect the poles to complete the framework.

While the framework is going up, about halfway through this phase, more volunteers go to Barb's house to pick up all the quilts. The quilts are all bundled up in sheets, tagged with their location in the show. Barb and Kathy have sorted all the quilts to their proper sheet and have tagged all the sheets in the two weeks between the judging and the show set up.
Once the stands have started going up and the drapes hung, then the quilts are brought in all wrapped up in the sheets. They are laid in each of their "cubicles" ready for the next phase of hanging.
The volunteers remove the quilts from the sheets, run a pole through the hanging sleeve and hand the pole and quilt up to the volunteer on the ladder. Other volunteers hand up " S " hooks to the ladder volunteer and the quilt is then hung in place. We had over 200 quilts, so this happened over 200 times!!!!!
In the other building, Paula Mariedaughter and Joan Beyette are putting together the String Quilt exhibit. Liza Ewing and her volunteers are putting up the Itty Bitty Committee display. Therese Ramsey is putting up the Modern Quilt Guild display AND the Small Quilt Auction. Linda Hancock is putting together the Antique Quilt exhibit. Sandy Vetter and Carol Parrish are setting up the Quilt Shop. Jo Ann Collier is getting the Quilting Treasures display put up. Lori Jones is getting the Appraisers area set up. Others are getting the Raffle Basket display, admissions table, raffle ticket table and volunteer table area set up.
At the end of the day, everything was set up. It was an exhausted crew that left that night. Helen Hefner and I made sure all the doors were locked, all the lights were turned off and all the gates were closed and locked.
We are ready for opening day!!!

Modern quilters work in different styles and define modern quilting in different ways, but several characteristics often appear which may help identify a modern quilt. These include, but are not limited to: the use of bold colors and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid color, improvisational piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work. "Modern traditionalism" or the updating of classic quilt designs is also often seen in modern quilting.

## Scrappy Quilt

made from strips of fabric-usually scraps, but there are plain and fancy versions of string quilts. Quiltmakers may use random scraps, selvages, blue jean scraps, or leftover pieces of fabric from other projects or even worn clothes. The strings may then be sewn to form a pattern or design to please the viewer's eye. Sometimes the fabric is stabilized on a foundation of newspapers or fabric.

The inspiration...I saw a picture of a ribbon in an older Woman's Day Quilt Magazine and decided I could make one like it. That was before the days of quick and trim-to-size piecing, so the 3" blocks that I decided to make were much more time consuming and labor intent than they are now. After a bit of trial and error I had the streamers and rosettes figured out. With two half-yard pieces of fabric, four yards of ribbon, a self-cover button and a hot glue gun along with some cereal box cardboard, I had a special ribbon made. Number of ribbons made...I have made the Best of Show, Judge's Choice and Viewer's Choice ribbons for all 15 Tomorrow's Heirlooms Quilt shows. That equals 30 years that I have been making these ribbons, so more than 45 ribbons because at times we have had two judges and each had their own winners. Biggest challenge...parting with the ribbons! They are my creation and it is hard for me to believe that anyone could care for them as much as I do. You know, like a quilt that you pour love into!

## How did you plan to gather items for the Guild Store?

Nora: A Stock the Shop Challenge. As program chair, I realized we needed to raise money as it is very costly to plan programs. Primarily, many have had concerns with relocating our quilt show to the fairgrounds. After visiting other quilt shows and seeing the neat items reasonably priced, I wanted to
 create for our Guild a Store that is the first place people want to go to! So these two things were the basis for me launching the Stock the Shop Challenge.

## How did you determine pricing of the items?

Nora: It was a team six who helped with the pricing. The night before the pricing party, one of the team members helped me carry all the containers from the garage into my house. We sorted everything all over the dining room by "like things" - this really helped the pricing party. Even with the items organized, it was an 8-9 hour process for the pricing team! I could not have done it without their help!

Sandy: We tried to price things to be attractive to shoppers and to be somewhat consistent. We bagged a lot of the fabric and sold much of that for one or two dollars a bag. All magazines and books were a set price. The last few hours we marked everything down.

## Anything you would improve upon for next show?

Sandy: The most difficult part was transporting the items from guild meetings to our houses, and then sorting and pricing. If anyone could come up with some ideas to improve on that, that would be great.

# Chatenge Quits 

## An interview with Mary Knapp

What is a challenge quilt?
A challenge quilt is a quilt made to specific rules.
What were the requirements of this year's challenge quilt?
Members were to take a picture of something that interested them and to reproduce it in fabric. A circle had to be added to the quilt and 2 items of interest could be added. Overall size of the quilt needed to be 120 inches. A copy of the picture had to be sent in with the quilt when it was judged.

Other challenges are not this specific and some are more complicated. Some challenges will have you receiving one or two pieces of fabric to be included in the challenge and then no other rules to adhere to. Some challenges let you make whatever you want--clothes, pot holders, large quilt, etc.

Where did you get the inspiration for the challenge?

My inspiration for this year's challenge was a picture I had wanted to replicate that we had taken on a trip to Alaska several years ago.


How many entries did you have?
This year there were 7 entries and all had beautiful quilts.
Any challenges?
The biggest challenge I had making my quilt was getting the depth perception I wanted. Of course, in the end, I found out I needed a math class much more than anything. My quilt was disqualified because it was too small--anyone able to give me some remedial math hints??
